Call for Abstracts

This conference will bring together scholars and professionals to work towards identifying current trends in the field of aging and anthropology, developing opportunities to further collaborate and strengthen our specialist network. In addition to academic presentations, there will be workshops and mentoring opportunities directed towards students and early career scholars to help create links with the professional and academic community.



The 2017 conference will also be organized with the cooperation of the Anthropology of Children and Youth Interest Group of the American Anthropological Association. In order to highlight this collaboration, this year's theme will be "**Culture, Commitment and Care across the Life Course**".

The theme addresses three main aims. First, we will seek to engage themes of the life course more broadly, including childhood, youth, and inter-generational relationships as well as later life. Second, the conference will examine the role of care from birth to death, highlighting the cultural diversity of care practices in light of new technologies, forms of relatedness, politics and economics. Third, we hope to reflect on the continuing relevance of Margaret Mead's landmark lectures on "Culture and Commitment" published in 1970 (pictured). Mead's

ecological perspective of inter-generational relations in the context of cultural change still presents questions and challenges for anthropology that can only be taken up through cross-cultural and life-course perspectives. By re-engaging

with Mead in light of the changes to the life course over the last 50 years, this conference will reflect on the significance of her approach and the relevance of life-course studies for reinvigorating anthropology in the coming decades.

We are seeking abstracts for papers, posters, panels, and roundtables, or other creative format (film, drama, interactive piece, etc.) on any aspects of aging and the life course from an anthropological perspective. We are especially interested in submissions that draw connections between generations and between different moments in the life course. Themes may include, but are not limited to

- *Changing patterns of the normative life course*
- *Representations of childhood and old age*
- *Vulnerability and dependence across the life course*
- *Cultural understandings of personhood over time*
- *Reminiscence and memory*
- *Intergenerational transfers and economies of care*
- *Political activity and rights among youth and older adults*
- *Aging youth cultures*
- *Wisdom and intergenerational narrative building*
- *Futurity and hope*
- *Gender and the life course*
- *The value of ethnography in human development*

Please include AAGE2017 in the subject line of your submission, along with your name, title, and affiliation. Abstracts should be no longer than 250 words. Be sure to indicate the type of submission (paper, poster, other) and if it is part of an organized panel. Abstracts will be peer reviewed (student abstracts will be read by fellow students).

Keynote presentations



Professor Mary Catherine Bateson

Visiting Scholar at the Sloan School of Aging and Work, Boston College, Her books include *With a Daughter's Eye*, *Composing a Life*, and *Composing a Further Life: The Age of Active Wisdom*. She was the Clarence J. Robinson Professor in Anthropology and English at George Mason University and is now Professor Emerita.



Professor Pia Christensen

Professor of Anthropology and Childhood Studies, School of Education, Leeds University, Her books include *Research with Children: Perspectives and Practices (ed.)* and *Children in the City: home, neighbourhood and community (ed.)*. Her work examines the lives of children in the UK and Denmark using mixed methods ethnography to focus on children's sense of agency, the body, space, and place.



Venue

The 2017 AAGE Conference will be hosted by the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences at [Oxford Brookes University](http://www.oxfordbrookes.ac.uk), one of the top ranked modern universities in the UK, located in the beautiful and historic city of Oxford, England.
